Report from the Texas Indigent Defense Commission (TIDC) for the June 28, 2019 Texas Judicial Council Meeting

TIDC Board and Committee Meetings

The TIDC <u>Full Board</u> met March 7th to discuss TIDC's legislative request, the current and upcoming grant cycle, and TIDC's policy and fiscal monitoring program. This meeting marked Chair **Nicole Collier's** and Judge **Chris Hill's** first meeting as board members.

TIDC's Grants and Reporting Committee met June 5th to



discuss the Formula Grant program, the upcoming Improvement Grant cycle, and extraordinary grant requests. The TIDC <u>Full</u> <u>Board</u> met again on June 6th to review the G&R Committee recommendations and to the discuss the 86th Legislature and the Policy-Fiscal Monitoring program. This meeting marked **Gonzalo Rios Jr**.'s first meeting as a board member.

86th Legislature

The Legislature increased TIDC funding and passed a bill requiring prioritization of public defender offices. TIDC is working to invest additional funds in improvements to indigent defense systems across the State.



- Claire Buetow was invited to testify before the House Criminal Jurisprudence Committee by Chair and TIDC Board Member Nicole Collier on February 11th.
- On March 7th, Scott Ehlers was invited to testify on Texas's Mental Health Defender programs at the <u>House County</u> <u>Affairs Committee</u> hearing.
- On April 8th, Wesley Shackelford testified as a resource witness on <u>HB</u>



<u>2973</u>, dealing with payments by defendants for legal services provided to them on appointed criminal cases. He was also available as a resource witness on <u>HB 1456</u> and <u>HB 1457</u>, both related to providing representation to arrestees at magistration.

- On April 11th, TIDC board member Alex Bunin testified in front of the Senate Nominations Committee regarding his appointment to the TIDC Board. On April 24th, the full Senate confirmed his <u>reappointment</u>.
- On April 15th, Wesley was available as a resource witness on <u>HB 3539</u> at the House Criminal Jurisprudence Committee.
- On April 24th, Wesley was available as a resource witness on <u>SB 583</u> and <u>SB 1649</u> at the Senate



Criminal Justice Committee.

•On May 1, the full Senate <u>confirmed</u> Judge Evans, Judge Hill, Judge Medary, and Gonzalo Rios to TIDC's board.

•Scott Ehlers was available as a resource witness on <u>SB 815</u> at the Senate Criminal Justice Committee meeting on May 1^{st} .

Staff Update

In addition to its normal monitoring, grants administration, and data collection, TIDC staff has been involved in the following:

 Joel Lieurance and Scott Ehlers hosted the <u>Central Texas Indigent Defense Coordinator</u> <u>Workshop</u> in Waco on February 1st. On March 18th, TIDC celebrated Gideon Day. *Gideon v. Wainwright* secured the right to counsel for millions of Americans. This was the 56th anniversary of that decision. TIDC made a <u>short</u> <u>video</u> commemorating the landmark decision.



- **Geoff Burkhart** traveled to Kentucky on March 30th to attend the National Association for Public Defense's (NAPD) Steering Committee meeting.
- Scott Ehlers met with judges and court administrators in Harris County regarding building a managed assigned counsel system on April 12th.
- On April 15th, **Geoff Burkhart** spoke at the Carver Library forum on creating a Travis County Public Defender's Office.



•Geoff Burkhart and Edwin Colfax traveled to Willacy County to meet with District Judge Cordova and Willacy County Judge Guerra in late April.

•On April 18th Geoff Burkhart moderated a roundtable discussion on Indigent Defense at the University of Texas School of Law.

- On April 30th, Alex Bunin and Geoff Burkhart testified at the <u>Travis County</u> <u>Commissioners Court</u> meeting. TIDC's testimony is under agenda item #14.
- On May 7th, Geoff Burkhart and Edwin Colfax testified at the Travis County Commissioners Court meeting.



- On June 11th, TIDC held the second meeting of the Texas Chief Defenders, bringing together chief public defenders and managed assigned counsel system directors from across the state.
- The following day, TIDC hosted the kickoff meeting for its statewide <u>Future Indigent Defense</u> <u>Leaders</u> training and mentorship program. The FIDL program will send 25 mentees to Gideon's Promise public defender training and pair them with a local mentor and regional hub to support them as they begin taking court appointments.
- TIDC staff has conducted policy or fiscal monitoring in Goliad, Fort Bend, Waller, Jefferson, and Jim Wells Counties. TIDC has offered technical assistance to Victoria, Brooks, and Duval Counties.
- TIDC staff has published final fiscal monitoring reports for <u>Parker County</u>, <u>Kendall County</u>, <u>Duval County</u>, and <u>Lee County</u>.
- TIDC staff have attended several presentations and training sessions, including the Center for Access to Justice's <u>State of the South Conference</u>, Texas Association of Counties (TAC) training for county judges, the Craig Washington & Rodney Ellis Criminal Law Seminar at the Thurgood Marshall School of Law, the Hays County Criminal Justice Reform Summit in San Marcos,



Medina County Day at the Texas Capitol, Texas Public Policy Foundation's <u>Bail</u> <u>Reform: The Balance of Liberty and Public</u> <u>Safety</u>, the <u>SAMHSA's GAINS Center's</u> Competency to Stand Trial/Competency Restoration Learning Collaborative, and the Texas Association of Pretrial Services 2019 Conference, <u>TCDLA's Rusty Duncan</u> <u>Advanced Criminal Law Course</u>.

Recent Publications

TIDC released the <u>FY18 Annual Report</u> on the agency's activities and accomplishments last year. In FY18, TIDC awarded \$23.3 million in Formula Grants, \$8.1 million in Improvement grants, and \$600,000 to innocence projects. We collected Indigent Defense Expenditure Reports (IDERs) from 254 counties and conducted policy or fiscal monitoring in 26 of those counties. TIDC also streamlined its complaint process, released 3 major publications, and trained over 1,000 judges, lawyers, magistrates, and elected officials.
