








District Judges Defeated in 2020 Primaries Years on Current Bench




Average Years of Service on Current Bench as of September 1




Turnover in Appellate and District Judges

So far, 65 judges have left or will leave office from September 2019 to December 2020.



The voluntary turnover rate declined in FYs 16/17 but increased again in the last biennium. Higher turnover is expected in the future due to retirements.




The percentage of judges voluntarily leaving office by **not** seeking reelection has been generally increasing since the fall of 2005.



Turnover in Appellate and District Judges by Biennium





Percentage of Appellate and District Judges Not Running for Reelection





More than half of judges who left in FYs 18 and 19 indicated that elections had a significant influence on their decision to leave.





Age of Judges as of September 1 55-64 35-44 45-54 65-74 75+


